

# **RCHS 2016 News**



The Board of Directors of the Randolph County Humane Society wishes to offer our

sincere gratitude to our community for making 2016 such a banner year for animals in Randolph County! We've been extremely busy, but with your help, we have done SO MUCH!

Between January and October 31, RCHS provided shelter for 727 dogs and cats. Of those, 77 were reunited with their families, and 339 were adopted locally, 167 were successfully adopted outside of our community with various rescue organizations, and some of them are still waiting for homes. Our adoption rate remains well above those of most shelters, so we will continue to claim wagging rights!

Our long-time partner, **PetSmart Charities**, made the decision this year to discontinue their former transport model. They no longer operate the Rescue Waggin' program, but are still active partners with us in supporting us as we continue transport efforts on our own. This is a challenge for us with limited staff, but we have developed relationships over the years with some stellar partners, and we continue saving lives through transport efforts.

**Spay/Neuter Program**. Every pet we adopt is already spayed or neutered, and we want to help you at home be part of this solution, too. We are committed to addressing the pet over-population issue at the root of the problem and have made this a priority program. Because of generous donations, this year we have been able to issue more spay/neuter vouchers than ever before. As our budget allows, we will have vouchers available. Please call the shelter at 304-636-7844 for availability and requirements. As we couldn't do this without our local veterinarians, please be sure to offer them your thanks for being partners with us!

**TNR**. The trap/neuter/return program involves humanely trapping, sterilizing and vaccinating feral and stray neighborhood cats and then returning them to the area where they were trapped. This program is designed to reduce the number of kittens born in our county, and we are already seeing the benefits. If you are feeding and caring for a group of cats in your area, please give us a call to see if we can help with spay/neuter.

#### **Investment Program**

Again this year, RCHS was approved as a Neighborhood Investment Program organization. The NIP was established by the West Virginia Legislature in 1996 to increase charitable giving to local nonprofit organizations, in order to increase the capacity of nonprofits to serve low-income persons in highly distressed neighborhoods. In our case, qualified donors can receive state tax credits for donations to our lowincome client spay/neuter fund!

West Virginia residents or businesses who contribute to the RCHS low-income client Spay/Neuter Fund are eligible to receive up to 50% of the contributed amount in the form of state tax credits. Donor individuals or businesses must be WV residents and the minimum eligible donation is \$500. Donors may use the credits to reduce tax liability for West Virginia personal income tax, corporate net income tax, and business franchise tax. #### **Off-Site Adoption Partner Program.**

At the end of 2015, we launched our wildly successful off-site adoption partner program, beginning with Fancy Paws downtown Elkins. Since then, eight local businesses have participated in the program, resulting in over 50 cat adoptions! We are always looking for new businesses who would like to help us promote



cats in Randolph County by hosting one or more in your business, giving those cats an opportunity to be in a non-shelter environment and gain exposure to potential adopters. # **Compassion in Action**

#### FOHO of WV Update

This past legislative session, Delegate Denise Campbell sponsored a bill which would provide funding for the the WV Spay Neuter Fund through an increase in the existing pet food fee paid to the WV Department of Agriculture. She was able to secure co-sponsors for this bill from both parties. Unfortunately, it did not pass, so we are still without a funding source. Please discuss this important measure with your legislator this year so that we can save lives and taxpayer dollars in WV.

- Yellow/Blue PineSol —3 bottles
- Bleach 8+ gallons
- Laundry Soap 3+ large bottles
- 55 Gallon Trash Bags one full roll
- Cat litter 300 lbs
- Break-away cat collars
- Blankets/Towels/Rugs
- Leashes/Collars
- Mops/Brooms
- Copy paper
- Office Supplies
- Printer Ink (HP 61)

#### **Finances and Fundraising**

As every business experiences, shelter operating expenses have increased due to a number of factors, including our expanded spay/neuter program. We operate on a budget of approximately \$300,000 annually. We receive \$80,000 from the County and \$6,000 from United Way, and the remainder of our costs must be met through donations, grants, adoptions fees and fundraising. In 2016, fundraising has generated approximately \$15,000. This is down from last year. <u>We still need the help of our friends and</u> <u>supporters to reach our budget goal</u>. #### **Collection Banks**

Around Elkins you may have noticed some little collection banks that are quietly doing a big job for the animals at the Randolph County Humane Society.

In about 20 locations such as local businesses, veterinary offices, restaurants, and movie theaters, customers are depositing their spare change into these collection banks. Those small donations add up. RCHS is receiving an average of about \$400 each month from these little banks! All the money received from these collection banks goes into the Spay/Neuter and Medical Expense fund at RCHS. With our shelter operating at full capacity most of the time, this fund serves a wonderful purpose - helping to prevent future pet overpopulation.
